
# SYNOPSIS

Audrey Barlow has woken up in the dead of night and needs to go to the dunny. The only problem is, the dunny is out the back and down the garden path. And if that isn't bad enough, Audrey sees what she thinks is a ghost! It's not such a far-fetched idea, especially as her twin sisters, Esther and Pearl, who died as infants are buried near the back path. But Audrey soon discovers that it wasn't a ghost she spotted at all, but a young aboriginal girl, her own age called Janet. Audrey soon learns that Janet has run away from a mission and together they must think of a way to keep Janet from the authorities and being taken again.

In Audrey's Big Secret Audrey faces her biggest dilemma yet – how can she protect her friend Janet and help her find the family that she so dearly misses without lying to her own family. Audrey's Big Secret is about loss and missing the things you love but no longer have. It offers a glimpse into the tragedy of the stolen generation, through the eyes of a child. It is tender and heart-felt. Readers will love Audrey and her plucky determination to see that something so wrong must be made right.

# WRITING AUDREY'S BIG SECRET: CHRISTINE HARRIS

## What inspired you to write Audrey's Big Secret?

I wanted to explore a moral dilemma with Audrey. The keeping or telling of secrets is a big part of life, anyone's life, not just that of a child. But children take some time to work out what their stand is on things like this. Also, it is more intriguing to explore a choice between two apparent 'rights' than an obvious 'right' and 'wrong'.

## How did the writing process for Audrey's Big Secret differ from writing the previous two books?

A little more weight of responsibility because after the first two books, I had fans who were eager for the next adventure and I wanted to keep them happy and interested.

Also, I had to be careful about how I portrayed Janet and the friendship of the two girls. Even a simple thing like how would Janet talk? Her English, being a second language learned at a mission, would not be perfect. But I didn't want her to look or sound as though she wasn't very bright. So I made sure that Audrey also stumbled over some words (after all she is only young) and that the girls were in sympathy/understanding with each other.

#### How did you research your character Janet? Was she a real girl?

I read a lot of material to get the words and voices of people who had been taken from their homes and sent to missions. I used a photograph as a prompt for Janet, but I didn't keep a record of the person's real name. It was just a face that fascinated me. I did know a Janet who was taken from her parents and I shocked to learn about it. And that was when I was a grownup. Until then, I hadn't heard anything about times in Australia's history where things like this happened. It all came out because we were discussing our ages and the real-life Janet said she had no idea how old she was.

## How important was it for you to include the theme of the Stolen Generation in the Audrey books?

The Stolen Generation is too big for one book, and too big for me to tackle, and not my place actually. 'Audrey's Big Secret' is about two girls, friends, with much in common, including a shared secret. However, I did discuss having the character of Janet with a writer who is Aboriginal. She said, 'How can you write a story about the Australian Outback in 1930 and not have Aborigines in it.' So I felt comfortable with including a single child, Janet.

#### What sort of a reaction are you getting to Audrey's Big Secret? From teachers? From kids?

It's early days. I haven't spoken to any child, yet, who has read it. But, the reviews are starting to come in and they are very positive.

#### Why do you think kids enjoy the Audrey series so much?

They love the character. Recently I was asked to sign an autograph by a young boy. I've already signed it,' I told him. But he said, 'Sign Audrey.' So now Audrey is not only getting more fanmail than me, the writer, she is now being asked for her autograph. That is wonderful. I also think children identify with Audrey's imagination. And they laugh over the funny things she says.

## ABOUT THE AUTHOR

CHRISTINE HARRIS has lived in many parts of South Australia, including some isolated rural locations. As a child her best friend, Jennifer Hobbar, was imaginary. Christine has always loved reading books and she had her first go at writing one perched in a tree when she was nine years old. She hasn't stopped writing since.

To date Christine has written more than fifty books including short stories, historical fiction, thrillers, horror, speculative fiction, humour, plays and picture books. She has received many awards for her writing, including being shortlisted for the Children's Book Council Book of the Year Award (*Jamil's Shadow*, 2002) and an Aurealis Award for speculative fiction (*Foreign Devil*, 2000). In 2006 she was honoured to receive the Carclew Fellowship.




