

SYNOPSIS

When Batthew Aromascent is born, he's declared 'the best Nose Candlenut has ever seen.' Batthew's parents are the infamous Roger and Joy Aromascent, the most famous Noses in Candlenut, and owners of the famed Olfactory fragrance house. But shortly after his birth, Batthew's mother and father disappear while on an expedition in the remote jungle, leaving Batthew with nothing but a letter and the seed of the rare Corpse Flower.

Eleven years later, the whole town waits with bated breath for the Corpse Flower to unfurl. revealing its legendary, hideous stench. But when the curtain is raised, the Titan Arum is gone! Candlenut's citizens are in uproar. The Titan Arum, Corpse Flower, last of its kind, totally extinct in the wild, is gone! And unless someone finds it in three days, it will die, leaving only a seed behind. Everyone's a suspect - the mysterious Vera Vetiver, who is said to taste smells with her tongue; Artemesius Musk, the maverick Nose behind STREETPIG, Olfactory's number 1 competition; even Batthew's Aunt Bella, head of Olfactory in his parent's absence. Would any of them really have stolen the flower? Could Batthew be the Nose to find the thief?

THEMES

The letter that Batthew's parents leave him tells him to keep the Titan Arum seed safe (p40). This letter fuels Batthew's sense of responsibility and makes him feel as if he needs to solve the mystery of the flower's disappearance to honour his parents. Later, when he is unable to find it, he feels that 'he'd let his mum and dad down' (p180). Discuss the way that the book explores themes of responsibility.

- What do you think Batthew's parents would say to him if they were there?
- How does Batthew feel when he thinks he's not going to find the corpse flower?
- Why do you that Batthew leaves the letter from his parents at the Corpse Flower memorial?

WRITING STYLE



- Why have Lavender and Batthew been warned to stay out of Deep Smog? What do they find there?
- What does Mr Sandalwood tell Batthew about coping with terrible smells?
- What does Batthew see when he's overcome by the scent of the Titan Arum? What do you think this vision means?

WRITING EXERCISE

Are you surprised when you learn who the Titan Arum thief really is? Imagine that one of the other suspects was really the thief and write an alternate ending for the story showing how they're caught (or how they get away with it!).

CREATIVE ACTIVITIES

- Toilet explains that The Museum District is designed in the shape of a fragrance wheel. What is a fragrance wheel? If you google 'fragrance wheel' you'll find some examples of fragrance wheels that perfumiers use to help them create their scents. Using one of these as a template, draw your own fragrance wheel but fill it in with the specific descriptions from the book, and draw a small image to accompany each description.
- 2. Batthew is trying to create a fragrance that captures his last memory of his mother. What's in it?

Think of a memory that's special to you and write a perfume recipe for it.

- 3. Read (or watch) *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* by Roald Dahl and use it as a comparative text to answer the following questions.
 - a. In Batthew Aromascent, who is most like Willy Wonka? Who is like Charlie and why?
 - b. What do both books say about creativity and experimentation?
 - c. How do both books explore themes of right and wrong?
 - d. The world of chocolate, just like the world of scent, is highly competitive. Why do you think this is?
 - e. What do you like about each of the books? What don't you like? Discuss your opinions in small groups.
- 4. Use the Pixar story spine (below) to write a blurb for book 2 in the adventures of Batthew and Lavender. What do you think will happen?
